FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

You're reading this after Halloween, but it was written be fore Trick-or-Treaters hit the streets. Halloween makes me think of scary things, and it's a bit of a scary time in many ways. The Stock Market is all over the place, the war in Ukraine continues to escalate, the balance of power in Washington is undecided, the supply chain continues to be disrupted, Kay and I are retiring early next year with no clear plan for what happens after that, and the church will be facing life with no called and installed pastor for possibly another 2 years. How do we handle that much uncertainty? It is a bit of a scary time.

But consider Jeremiah's scary situation (chapter 32, verses 1-25). He'd been prophesying that Israel would be defeated by its enemies due to its lack of faith in God for so long that the king of Israel put him in jail to shut him up. The Chaldeans had taken much of Israel's land, had besieged the city where Jeremiah was a prisoner, and it was only a matter of time before the city fell. And yet with imminent defeat facing them, Jeremiah was given the opportunity to buy land from his cousin that was already in the Chaldeans' control.

Imagine if you had the opportunity to buy a piece of property worth a million dollars for \$10,000, but it was located in the eastern part of Ukraine. Would you buy it? Talk about a risky investment! And that's what Jeremiah faced in his situation, but he chose to make that investment anyway. It was a symbolic action to show his nation that God would not ultimately forsake them. Even though they were about to be overrun, and possibly forcibly removed from that land and sent to live as refugees in another country, the promise of God to restore them to the Promised Land was still in effect.

The point from this story is that despite uncertain times, God remains true to his promise that he will be with us, and will see us through to better days.

For Kay and me, that means that despite not having Branchville as our church family next year, God will find a way to support us and see to it that we will not go into the future alone.

For the church, it means that the strength this congregation has developed in its fellowship, its service, its ministries, and outreach will continue to make a difference in the interim period, and eventually result in a relationship with a new called pastor as welcoming and effective as it has been for us over the past 33 years.

So let's remember God's faithfulness as we face an uncertain future, and do so assured that God's love and grace will carry us forward in new and wonderful ways. The future belongs to God, which makes it a lot less scary.

<u>PER CAPITA REMINDER</u> - Just a friendly reminder for those who have not yet paid their Per Capita this year - it is \$40/person and helps our church a great deal when we don't have to take such a large sum from our already tight budget. As of November we have only received \$2,124.00 towards our \$8,520.00 due. In 2023 it raises to \$42.50/person.

OCTOBER SESSION MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

- Demetri Savapolous will begin his Eagle Project of relocating our Food Pantry soon.
- Pledges As of August 31, 2022, we were \$12,372 behind in pledges YTD. In September 2022, the shortfall increased by \$3218. The difference in giving from September 2021 to September 2022 is now \$15,590. It is unlikely we will come anywhere near making budget. (So please check your pledged amount to date and catch up as much as possible thank you!)
- Member Giving we are a little less ahead (\$510) than we were in August.
- Other (non-member giving) We are \$1,813 behind where we were last September. This is about the same as last month.
- Total operating income as of September is still \$10,118 behind last September but this is \$1.252 better than last month.
- Per Capita will be \$42.50 for 2023.
- Approved the Administrative Assistant position to change from hourly to a salaried position @ \$24,000/year starting in January 2023.
- Approved the draft budget which shows a deficit of \$1,572 for 2023. The proposed budget for 2023 is \$192,700 for income and \$194,272 for expenses.

REGIPE OF THE MONTH

Apple Pie

INGREDIENTS

- Dough for double-crust pie
- 1/3 cup sugar
- 1/3 cup packed brown sugar
- 1/4 cup all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 6 to 7 cups thinly sliced peeled tart apples
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 1 tablespoon butter
- 1 large egg white
- Optional: Turbinado or coarse sugar, ground cinnamon, vanilla bean ice cream and caramel sauce

PREPARATION

- 1. Preheat oven to 375°. On a lightly floured surface, roll half of the dough to a 1/8-in.-thick circle; transfer to a 9-in. pie plate. Chill while preparing filling. In a small bowl, combine sugars, flour and spices. In a large bowl, toss apples with lemon juice. Add sugar mixture; toss to coat. Add filling; dot with butter.
- 2. Roll remaining dough to a 1/8-in.-thick circle. Place over filling. Trim, seal and flute edge. Cut slits in top. Beat egg white until foamy; brush over crust. If desired, sprinkle with turbinado sugar and ground cinnamon.
- 3. Bake on the lowest rack 60-70 minutes, until crust is golden brown and filling is bubbly, covering with foil halfway if crust begins to get too dark. Cool on a wire rack. If desired, serve with ice cream and caramel sauce.


