A NOTE FROM OUR PASTORS

(This month's is from Pastor David)

Dear Friends:

Ash Wednesday came early this year and with it came the arrival of the season of Lent. We "resurrected" an ecumenical service that was held here in Branchville at the Methodist Church. The service included communion and the imposition of ashes.

"Imposition" is one of those technical terms used to describe the placing of ashes on the forehead or the hand. Often the word is used to describe something that is put upon us like an imposed tax or an added burden. Sometimes we apologize for something we are about to ask someone to do by saying, "I hope this isn't an imposition on your time."

When it comes to Ash Wednesday, "imposition" might be a good word to describe this act after all. Worship, in general, and Ash Wednesday, in particular, is an imposition on us. It is an added burden to our daily schedule and routine. But the burden of worship is also a source of its blessing in our lives. It is important to remember that we are more than just the sum of our accomplishments. It is good to recall the words of the Ash Wednesday liturgy: "Remember you are dust, and to dust you shall return."

So often we allow our own agendas, needs, wants and desires to crowd out any thoughts of the needs of others or the purposes of God. We quickly slide into a sea of self-indulgence with frequent side trips to the islands of self-absorption and self-pity.

Worship has a capacity to lift us out of our solo cruise around our own little world so that we can see a larger picture, a more varied landscape than we ever imagined. Remembering what God has done for us in Christ Jesus can renew us and free us from our captivity to our past or to the narrow view of our present or our presumed future.

Especially after our Pandemic experience, if you have found that attending regular worship has become less of a priority in your life, you might want to reconsider!

Throughout this year of worship you will hear the breadth of the gospel message of good news and hope. You will be challenged by things you had been unaware of in the past. You may even sense some urgency and a tug upon you to consider ways you might be of service to others.

The stain of the ashes on Ash Wednesday lingers throughout the season of Lent and throughout our lives whether or not we chose to have them imposed on us at the Ash Wednesday service. They are the flip side of the water of our baptism. Just as we walk through life "wet" because of God's claim upon us in baptism, we also walk through life marked with ashes.

May the reminder of God's presence and powerful plan to save us keep us humble and thankful, focused on God and better able to view ourselves and those around us.

I hope it isn't an imposition to say: "See you in church!"

- Sunday School has volunteers signed up thru June. Please volunteer.
- A "Soup and Study" series will begin on February 22 thru March 21st. It is a Lenten study called "Gospel Portraits of Jesus".
- A motion was approved for joining the Frankford Plains Methodist Church and the Branchville Methodist Church's Vacation Bible School if they are agreeable.
- There will be an inquiry class for anyone interested in membership in April. Date to be determined
- Considering magnetic name tags to be worn during fellowship/coffee hour. This will help new members and potential new pastor in getting to know the names of everyone.
- Considering a picture directory to be done "in-house". John Newcomer may be interested in assisting with taking pictures.
- Possible Fellowship activities being considered:

- Book club for women.
- Dinners hosted in homes of parishioners in the spring.
- Opening balance this month was \$94,558.61.
- First payment of \$626.88 has been made for Per Capita.
- January New Covenant disbursement was \$4,357.57.
- FMI donated \$3,500 to the church in January.
- Food Pantry received \$420 in donations in memorial of Jean Ransom.
- On Palm Sunday, we will have a purple drape on the cross. On Good Friday we will have a black drape on the cross. On Easter Sunday we will have a flower on a cross on the front lawn.
- Our pianos have been valued at \$750 and \$500. They will be put on Facebook to sell for a donation to the church.
- A motion was approved to purchase a copyright license for music.
- A motion was approved to purchase the 2024 Lenten devotional from Outlook.
- The kitchen exhaust hood has been installed.
- County Health Department has approved our kitchen as "base of operations" for the hot dog food truck.
- Looking for a used dishwasher.
- We have received 25 out of 110 pledges. This is \$56,420 pledged vs \$80,000 budget.
- Per Capita remains the same as last year. \$42.50. We have received \$240.50 towards Per Capita. That is 5.66 people.
- The church website page is being updated.
- Pastor David has submitted a request to Presbytery for a grant for \$2,000 to re-build the website and for new microphones.
- At the January Presbytery meeting, we were advised that there will be a "Presbytery scramble".
 (swapping pastors and a few members) Need to sign up by March 4th. More info to follow.
- It was approved to hold a pet adoption day with the help of "Cold Nose, Warm Heart".
- Mike Opilla will spearhead a blood drive in honor of Jean Ransom.

HOLY WEEK EVENTS

Palm/Passion Sunday, 10 a.m. March 24th

We will gather on Thursday evening for a service of Scripture, Sermon, prayers and Holy Communion, in remembrance of this sacred night.

Good Friday Ecumenical Service, 7 p.m.

This year we are hosting our friends from the Branchville and Frankford Plains United Methodist Churches for a remembrance of Jesus' crucifixion and death. The service will include Scripture, reflections on the 7 Last Words, combined choirs, and prayers.



Easter Morning, 10 a.m.



The celebration of the Resurrection of Jesus Christ is the highpoint of the Christian calendar. We hope you will be able to join us for this special day!

WORSHIP NOTES

Our order for worship is also called the Service for the Lord's Day. It is rooted in scripture, traditions of the larger Christian church and in our Reformed heritage. The Word and the Sacraments are central in worship and are the basis for our faith and life together.

When we gather together to worship God, we are proclaiming our witness to the world. We are the body of Christ, gathered for worship, sent out into the world in mission. When does worship begin? Our Book of Common Worship states that worship begins as people gather. The people prepare for worship by praying in silence or during music offered to God. It is a gift to all of us to gather, and to begin with centering our hearts and minds on the worship of God.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Potato & Spring Onion Pancakes

INGREDIENTS

- 140g floury potatoes (weighed after peeling), cut into large chunks
- 50g self-raising flour
- ½ tsp bicarbonate of soda
- 3 large eggs
- 5 tbsp MILK
- 3 spring onions
- 2 Tsp sunflower oil
- Knob of butter
- 6 strips of bacon



PREPARATION

- 1. Put the potatoes in a large pan of salted water and boil until tender. Drain well, tip back into the pan, shake for 1 min over a gentle heat to dry them off, then mash and leave to cool.
- 2. Put the cooled mash in a bowl with the flour and bicarb. Whisk 1 egg with the milk, season, tip into the bowl and whisk until smooth. Stir in the spring onions, reserving some to serve.
- 3. In a non-stick frying pan, heat half the oil and butter until sizzling, then spoon in half the pancake batter to make 3 pancakes. Cook for 1 min or so on each side until browned and set underneath, then flip and cook the other side. Keep warm in the oven while you make 3 more pancakes.
- 4. Wipe out the pan, add the bacon and sizzle until almost crisp. Push to one side and crack in the 2 remaining eggs with a splash more oil if needed. Fry to your liking, then serve with the pancakes and bacon, sprinkled with the remaining spring onions.
